Have you begun planning for the fall season? Since March 2020, we've been living through the global pandemic, and changes in the ways we do things happen every day. Women of the ELCA has made adjustments, too. And we are here to help you plan so you can remain connected and engaged in living out your faith in Jesus Christ. We have many resources to help you plan for your next virtual meeting. It's important that you reach out to women for connection and encouragement.

BELOW ARE 10 WAYS YOU CAN ENCOURAGE & STAY CONNECTED

Remember, as you begin to plan and in the midst of Covid-19 congregational units be sure you use caution in meeting and planning events. The following resources and ideas are available to keep women engaged as we shelter in place.

- Hold a Thankoffering service virtually with Light the Way for Justice, Light the Way for Love. The tips section offers ways to hold a virtual Thankoffering service.
- Use Giving Thanks to God, All Day Every Day prayer resources as you continue your daily Thankoffering discipline while sheltering at home.
- Get started on the 2021 Quilt Challenge. Download the challenge rules and begin designing a quilt for this much-loved artistic event that is part of our triennial Gathering.
- Download our In-Kind Gifts fact sheet so that you and the women in your congregation can begin now collecting items to assist ministries in ELCA congregations and other Phoenix-based agencies.
- Gather women (virtually) in prayer each Tuesday at noon as we continue to pray for the world and its inhabitants as we live through this pandemic, using this call to prayer.
- Encourage women to participate in the Dear Friend in Christ project, an effort to sustain community through letter writing. Details are found here, www.womenoftheelca.org/special-initiatives/dear-friend-christ and you can read some letters from the project. The project continues through November 1, All Saints Day.
- Use the PowerPoint *A Place for You* available in English and Spanish by hosting a virtual introduction to Women of the ELCA. Go to our Tools for Leaders page and scroll down.
- Read a book related to racial justice. You can find a list on our justice web page. Again, scroll down a bit.
- Encourage your friends to sign up for Bold Connections and invite them to participate in a virtual *Gather* Bible study.
- Read the blog, "Supporting Your Community of Women, Virtually" to learn other ways to support each other virtually.

JUST LOVE

2021 Quilt Challenge

Quilters of all abilities are invited to create a quilt responding to two things: one side interprets the Just Love theme of the 2021 Gathering and the reverse side interprets your response to the coronavirus pandemic. The challenge comes not only in interpreting these two things, but also in working within the following rules.

1. The quilt must interpret the gathering theme Just Love on one side and interpret the quilter's personal response to the coronavirus pandemic on the other side.
2. The quilt must incorporate the red color in the gathering's logo. Other colors may be used as the quilter desires.
3. The finished perimeter of the quilt must be within the range of 60 to 100 inches. Any shape can be used as long as the perimeter is within 60 to 100 inches.
4. Traditional or original patterns may be used. Credit must be given when using the pattern or design of another.
5. Quilts may be pieced or appliqued or a combination. They may include surface embellishment techniques (e.g., dyeing, trapunto, stenciling, whole cloth, embroidery, painting, embossing, etc.).
6. Quilts must be quilted, not tied. Either machine quilting or hand quilting is acceptable.
7. No fabric identification label is required. Quilters are asked to sign their quilt, however.
8. No sleeve for hanging is required.
9. The challenge is open to all women who are members of ELCA congregations. Quilts must be the work of a single individual. No group or two-person quilts will be accepted. Quilts must be constructed and quilted by the person named on the entry blank. The quilter need not be planning to attend the 2021 Gathering in order to participate in the quilt challenge.
10. There is a limit of two entries per person. The entry fee is \$10, which includes return shipping. Details for on-site pickup at the close of the Gathering will be provided closer to the event.
11. All quilts must be received in the churchwide office by June 11, 2021, along with a completed entry form and accompanying entry fee. Mail quilts to Women of the ELCA, Quilt Challenge, 8765 W Higgins Road, Chicago IL 60631-4101.
12. Entries will be judged by members of the Arizona Quilters Guild. Winners will be selected for originality, adherence to selected themes, workmanship, creative use of materials and overall design execution.
13. Winners and qualifying entries will be on display at the 2021 Gathering, Phoenix Convention Center, Phoenix, Arizona.

DISCIPLESHIP

What does discipleship mean to you? Women of the ELCA participants are active disciples in many ways.

dis·ci·ple·ship *noun* [di-'sī-pəl' ship]

- a: discipleship is a lifelong journey of living out and spreading the good news of Jesus Christ.
- b: disciples are followers of Jesus who are intent on carrying out the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19–20) and the Great Command (Acts 1:8).

At WELCA, participants practice seven marks of discipleship: praying, studying, worshiping, inviting, encouraging, serving, and giving. Whether it be making quilts and health and school kits for [Lutheran World Relief](#) or [studying the Bible together](#), or assisting in worship, they grow in faith and share what they’ve learned with friends and neighbors.

Thankofferings: our history

Beginning in the late 19th century, Lutheran women were given small Thankoffering boxes to place in a special location in their homes as a visible reminder of blessings received. Women would add coins to those boxes almost daily as particular blessings were noted. From their use came the idea of an annual church service to celebrate their collection, and so the women of the congregation would come together for a Thankoffering service. The concept of Thankoffering celebrations dates back more than 100 years and beyond Lutherans. The Episcopal Church Women held their first recorded Thankoffering service in 1889, and the World Thank Offering service of the United Methodist Women has been a tradition for over 100 years. In the Lutheran tradition, the General Synod's Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society created their first Thankoffering service in 1889 to celebrate the 10th anniversary of the organization. At that first Thankoffering, \$6,100 was collected. Today, Women of the ELCA collects more than \$1 million in Thankofferings annually for the ministries and mission of our women's organization.

Thankofferings: continuing the tradition

Thankofferings show gratitude for God's blessings and give us an important and tangible way to express that gratitude. It is a tradition grounded in our celebration of community, of meeting together to joyfully give thanks for what God has given us. Thankofferings have always been, and still are, our opportunity to say thank you to God in both significant and ordinary moments.

The daily acknowledgement of God's blessings through mite boxes has been a spiritual benefit to more than one soul, and the committee recommended their use not only once in ten years, but every day of the year. —American Lutheran General Synod Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society Thankoffering committee report: 1889
